

**KIDS VS GLOBAL WARMING CO<sub>2</sub> PETITION  
STATE RESPONSES AS OF SEPTEMBER 9, 2011**

<b>STATE</b>	<b>RESPONSE</b>
Arkansas	No. Final response. Petition is procedurally defective (does not meet regulatory processing requirements).
Connecticut	No. Final response. CT is already working to mitigate state contributions to GHGs under the Global Warming Solutions Act.
Delaware	Analysis in progress.
District of Columbia	No. Final response. GHG is a national issue to be addressed at the federal level.
Florida	No. Final response. Even if the petitioners' allegations were accurate, the many still-emerging and complex scientific, economic and policy considerations persuade FL against initiating rulemaking.
Idaho	No. Final response. Cost, impracticality of implementation, and disagreement that the Public Trust Doctrine in ID extends to the atmosphere.
Iowa	No. Final response. IA already has a GHG inventory requirement and has adopted and will adopt federal GHG rules; legislatively appropriated funding for additional programs needed.
Kansas	Analysis in progress.
Kentucky	No. Final response. KY is not obligated to file a formal response and will not do so.
Louisiana	No. Final response. GHG is a national issue to be addressed at the federal level; environmental protection must consider social and economic costs.
Maine	Likely no. Analysis in progress. There are programs already in place similar to what they are requesting, and ME is not planning to undertake anything further at this time.
Maryland	Analysis in progress.
Michigan	No. Final response. GHGs already regulated by Tailoring Rule; should be handled on a national level.
Nevada	No. Final response. Lack of specificity on costs, questionable science, governor's executive order freezing regulations.

New Hampshire	No. Final response. NH is already participating in a number of state and federal programs to address CO <sub>2</sub> .
North Carolina	No. Final response. Petition is procedurally defective (does not meet regulatory processing requirements).
South Carolina	No. Final response. Lack of legal authority, piecemeal approach is not reasonable, multipollutant approach is more effective than regulating pollutants independently.
Tennessee	No. Final response.
Texas	No. Final response.
Virginia	No. Final response. GHG is a national issue to be addressed at the federal level.
West Virginia	No. Final response. WV is not obligated to formally respond and will not do so.
