#### House-Senate Omnibus Riders for FY 2021

- EPA is urged to work cooperatively with state and local air agencies to develop a final rule for the Cleaner Trucks Initiative addressing heavy-duty truck emissions;
- prohibition of any rules that would require the regulation of emissions from livestock.
- prohibition on EPA using funds to implement a mandatory greenhouse gas reporting system for manure management systems.

#### FY 2021 House Riders

- EPA to continue to regulate emissions of hazardous air pollutants from power plants under Section 112 (i.e., retain the Mercury and Air Toxics Standards);
- Prohibition on funding for EPA to finalize the proposed "Oil and Natural Gas Sector: Emission Standards for New, Reconstructed, and Modified Sources Review";
- Prohibition on funding to finalize, implement or enforce EPA's April 30, 2020, particulate matter NAAQS proposal;
- Prohibition on funding to implement, administer or enforce EPA's July 15, 2020 revision to National Environmental Policy Act;
- Prohibition of rejection of grant applications that use the terms "global warming" or "climate change";
- transfer \$1 million to Targeted Airshed Grants;

- expression of disappointment in EPA's guidance, "COVID-19 Implications for EPA's Enforcement and Compliance Assurance Program," because "the policies put into place are far in excess of what is appropriate and necessary..." EPA should modify it in accordance with specifics in the report language;
- EPA is urged to work cooperatively with state and local air agencies to develop a final rule for the Cleaner Trucks Initiative addressing heavy-duty truck emissions;
- additional resources for EPA's monitoring and compliance activities related to emissions of ethylene oxide. The committee urges EPA to engage with communities to adequately address their concerns and to incorporate validated monitoring data into its rulemaking (page 88 of report);
- prohibit EPA funds for finalizing or implementing the proposed rule entitled, "Strengthening Transparency in Regulatory Science" that EPA proposed on 4/30/2020; and
- \$450 million for DERA to be available until 9/30/2023 as part of supplemental funds for "Additional Infrastructure Investments." The provision would waive state grant loan matching requirements.

- prohibition of any rules that would require the regulation of emissions from livestock.
- prohibition on EPA using funds to implement a mandatory greenhouse gas reporting system for manure management systems.

## Final FY 2020 Bill Riders (same as in FY 2019 bill)

- prohibition on the issuance of regulations calling for Title V permits for GHG emissions from biological processes associated with livestock production; and
- prohibition on issuance of a rule that includes mandatory reporting of GHG emissions from manure management.
