The federal government is currently operating under a Continuing Resolution until February 18, 2022. It provides continued funding at FY 2021 levels.

If EPA wishes to change the formula, it should submit a proposal in its FY2022 budget justification for the Committee's consideration. House-Senate Omnibus Riders for FY 2022

- prohibition of funds for rules that require Title V permits for carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide, water vapor, or methane emissions.
- prohibition on EPA using funds to implement any rule provision requiring mandatory reporting of greenhouse gas emissions from manure management systems.
